



11th Grade College Roadmap

Junior year is one of the most critical years in your educational journey. The hard work earned will set the foundation for college success!

The following steps per semester will help keep you on track per semester:

- Use the BBBS <u>Future Planning</u> form to create a future plan together with your Big and keep your mentor informed of your progress
- Think about which careers interest you and take an assessment test

- Meet with your guidance counselor
- sit down with your counselor and ensure you are on schedule to graduate and make any adjustments needed; review your GPA and talk about ways to improve

• explore acquiring post-secondary college credits through the <u>dual</u> <u>enrollment</u> program (taking college-level courses before while in high school)

- inquire about enrolling in <u>Advanced Placement</u> courses
- Maintain high marks because colleges put a lot of weight on grades obtained during the last two years of high school
- Use a planner to keep yourself organized
- Join and keep up with extracurricular activities; it will help make you a well-rounded student and increase your chances for college admission
- Seek leadership roles in any organization, student government, or sports team that you are a part of
- Sign up for AKA's <u>College Admission Process</u> (#CAP) program in the Fall
- Attend college fairs with your Big

 <u>Probe College Tour</u>

Learn about the <u>financial aid</u> process

• discuss and explore how much your family can contribute towards your college education

- it is required to complete the <u>FAFSA</u> (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) before you can apply for any financial aid assistance
- explore the different forms of financial aid
- attend College Financial Aid workshops in the Fall and refer to monthly Match Support for announcements

Register through your school to take the **<u>PreACT</u>** in September or

the <u>PSAT</u> in October; ensure to review test results to identify areas for improvement (PSAT can only be taken once a year)

Begin to study for the <u>ACT</u> or <u>SAT</u>

- know the <u>difference</u> between both tests and pick which one suits you the best
- explore with your school counselor the possibility of being eligible for an <u>ACT</u> or <u>SAT</u> waiver and ask about free study materials
- take the practice tests to help get highest score possible and use the following sites:

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- Plan your senior year courses with your counselor and begin to request letters of recommendation from teachers and/or counselor
- Register to take the <u>ACT</u> and/or <u>SAT</u> exam
- Apply for scholarships in May (utilize your involvement in BBBS on your applications)
- Explore and apply for scholarships early; below are the best websites where juniors can apply

- Create and finalize your <u>resume</u> and apply for a job or internship
- Plan summer college tours with your Big
- Think about selecting 3 colleges: a "dream" school, "target" school, and "safety" school and begin to explore their admissions process online
- Work on college application essay drafts over the summer and have your Big review them
- ♦ Consider alternatives like trade schools, community college, and the <u>Year Up</u> program and <u>sign up</u> for a free informational session
 - you can save money by attending a community college for the first 2 years and then transferring to your preferred school
- If you graduate from the Year Up program, you may receive up to 31 college credits.
- Continue to read daily and review BBBS <u>Life Skills</u> list with your Big to ensure you are prepared to tackle life and adulthood
